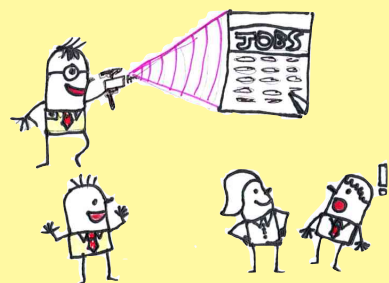
Nose Doctor

If you think your tongue is sensitive, you may be a good water sommelier.

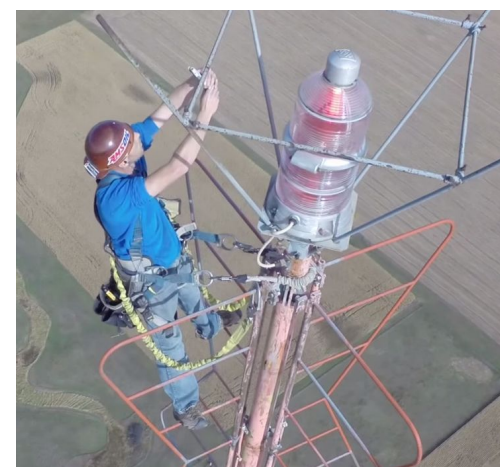
Radio Tower Worker

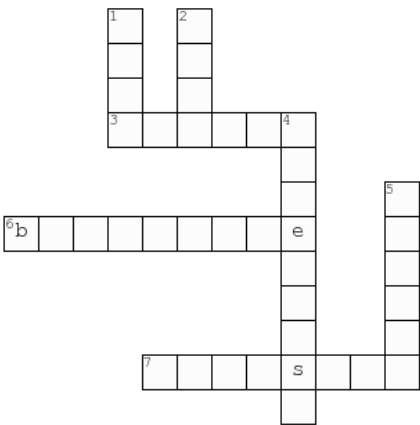
